Congregation B'nai Maccabim is more than just a place of worship and teaching, it is a *community*. As such, we are committed to helping and equipping our members to deal with the unique




challenges that face each of us in a twenty-first century world. In 2002, our members adopted a formal Mission/Vision Statement that reflects both who we are and what we are committed to.
